Can feel daunting: so many issues affecting and damaging women and children. Also the pervasive effect of the pandemic socially and psychologically.

'Women's Charter'/governance gives us all an agreed on thing to hold onto

I think there is something in communication too. Picking up on what you said at the beginning Victoria about recognising climate change as the overarching issue that makes other issues harder to resolve. I had a similar journey. I think there is a role for all of us to help communicate what climate

change means for everyone. Not to discount others work and issues they are passionate about, but to help them strengthen their own narratives and work. If people can't see climate impacts and how that relates in their own lives it will be hard for them to accept good governance structures.

Plenty of strong women in Extinction Rebellion.

In preparing the Charter, important to recognise and be inclusive for women of different cultures, experiences, personalities and ways of 'doing'.

I love that reversal - hands, heart, head.

The ONLY way we can do something in time before Hot House Hell destroys us is vote for a strong 3rd Party (Greens) that has 75% reduction in GHGs policy by 2030.

That provides a focus - go out and campaign for the Greens or the Independents!

I vote and belong to Animal Justice Party. They stand for Animals. People. Planet.

Here's a useful thought from Rudolf Steiner: The healthy social life is found when in the mirror of each human soul the whole community finds its reflection, and when in the community the virtue of each one is living.

Vote for a party that is addressing climate change.
