My QUESTION is for Kerry Chikaovski with other speakers if they want to contribute ... You used the word "Bouyant" suggesting that you feel we will float above the turbulence of Climate Change. Can you please unpack further as to why and how you arrived at that promise of buoyancy? What do you think it will take us as a glove move from floating above the impending Climate Chaos to actually getting us all to Dry Land in a scenario where the Climate Crisis Puzzle is SOLVED?

What would you define as too late?

Question: Murdoch (Sky/ News Corp) still controls much of the public messaging on climate change. How do we as women collectively address the issue of ongoing media capture by vested interests driving climate denial/ delay? What does a non-partisan approach to this look like?

Biloela story shows how important is that influence of women - driven by local women from the beginning. Action with compassion.

Not so interested in the 'women in parliament' conversation. Can we hear a bit more of Cheryl's thinking about Climate as a Security Threat. Good we are onto participatory democracy as a different process altogether.

The wonderful thing about the last election was it seemed as if the COMMUNITY had engaged and acted to make change and strengthen our democracy so the people who went forward were supported by their local community.

Good point, @Cheryl, re need to keep up grassroots pressure. There was a strong message from the last election that people wanted more respectful, collaborative, representative-of-community and accountable parliament taking strong action on climate change - yet we are seeing so many (male) leaders, particularly not taking that lesson on board.

Cheryl, the Community up approach is reassuring. Everyone needs to have it meaningful change and risk management make sense to them.

Australian Parents 4 Climate Action had their pilot adopted in NSW... to create community batteries and solaring schools, kindies, child care. ... This model has been flagged as a solution to our renewable energy mgt.

Thanks for your reply to my question, Kerry about your confidence in a bipartisan approach to energy policy. I'm not persuaded that conservative politicians (even some of the Teal independents) are prepared to work on the wider issues, enumerated by Cheryl, that will arise in the context of a changing climate.

question to Cheryl: as the 'war industries' of the world are the biggest climate emitters of any of the world's industries, how does 'defence of the nation' (if that is actually possible), fits with defence of the earth - and her women and children who are increasingly the victims of war.

My question is for Kerry. Given the climate crisis and the urgent need for action, do you believe that a large coal mining expansion directly under the Sydney water catchment is a good idea? If you believe it is not a good idea, would you consider personally contacting your incumbent, NSW planning minister, Anthony Roberts and urge him to reject the Dendrobium mine expansion? Sadly our children cannot drink coal

"Collaboration is self-interest"

Climate change is directly impacting on the Torres Strait Islands right now - whilst they are a part of Australia, all too often they are not even mentioned in climate change discussions. Some islands might not even be habitable within the next decade...

"most powerful thing for change is changing the attitude"

I really enjoy listening to your 'community' oriented perspective Cheryl.
